Big wins for our major project—IQ-RAP

We have now welcomed major funding commitments by both the Federal Australian Labor Party (\$500 million) and Liberal National Coalition (\$500 million+ but awaiting more details) to road upgrade priorities identified in our work on the Inland Queensland Roads Action Project (IQ-RAP). Please see pages 8 and 9. Katter's Australia Party's website states it is seeking \$40 million for the Hann Highway and \$100 million for Gulf roads. We are monitoring for other announcements.

Economic recovery from the floods

RDA, through its role on the Townsville Economic Recovery Taskforce, provided input to Townsville City Council's submission to the Queensland Government that advocated and secured an increase from \$10,000 to \$25,000 in the initial tranche of Federal/ State funded disaster grants for small businesses directly affected by flooding. This is of benefit to all flooded small businesses across the disaster-declared local government areas of Cloncurry, Flinders, McKinlay, Richmond and Townsville. For more information: http://

RDA, through its role in chairing the Townsville Local Content Committee, is organising the next meeting with the insurance industry and their panel providers to receive an update on the rebuild after the floods and in particular to monitor the uptake of local content as advocated strongly by the Deputy Premier, Mayor Hill and the Townsville Local Content Committee in the February and March meetings. Furthermore we are organising a meeting to promote consideration of our region's businesses to be preselected for future disaster recovery work.

Strong engagement and goodwill ensured we are now busy with follow up to seek out new specific opportunities aligned with each of our organisations' roles and resources.

Federal election commitments to date — 22 April 2019

Liberal National Party

While in government they have committed \$540 million from the \$1.5 billion Northern Australia allocation of Roads of Strategic Importance (ROSI) to northern Queensland corridors that are mostly in IQ-RAP:

- Tennant Creek to Townsville
- Mount Isa to Rockhampton
- Townsville to Roma
- Cairns to the NT border

They have also committed to complete the sealing of the Hann Highway, sealing of the Springsure to Tambo road, an additional \$320 million to the Warrego Highway (we are awaiting details of sections in IQ-RAP), passing lanes on the Capricorn Highway and the completion of the Northern Australia and Northern Australia Beef Roads programs.

They also made a commitment of \$2.2 billion for programs, including; Roads to Recovery, Black Spot, Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity and Bridges Renewal Programs that are available to local governments.

Australian Labor Party

While in opposition they have promised, if elected, \$500 million for Queensland's inland roads.

The road projects include:

- Barkly Highway between Mount Isa and Cloncurry
- Capricorn Highway between Emerald and Rockhampton
- Mitchell Highway from Cunnamulla to Charleville
- Kennedy Highway between Cairns and Mareeba

Labor's National Platform, which outlines key policy priorities, states Labor will fund targeted national programs, including; Black Spot Program, Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program and Bridges Renewal Program. We are awaiting details on funding levels for these programs.

While in opposition, Labor stated the above \$500 million funding commitment followed the strong advocacy and work of the Inland Queensland Roads Action Project.



IQ-RAP partners are seeking \$2.2 billion in funding over 10 years for the road and bridge upgrade priorities identified in the 2018 Inland Queensland Road Network Strategy and Appendices. The priorities can be funded through existing programs such as the Roads of Strategic Importance, Roads to Recovery, Black Spot, Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity, Bridges Renewal, Northern Australia and Northern Australian Beef roads programs and any new infrastructure programs targeting productivity, safety and economic development outcomes.



INLAND QUEENSLAND ROAD NETWORK STRATEGY MAP



The map indicates the strategic freight routes, as identified by partner local governments, in the area west of the Bruce Highway as per the scope of the project and the prioritisation of investment into 4, 10,15 and 15+ year program horizons to reach vision standards based on multi-criteria assessment (MCA). MCA Ratings 1, 2 and 3 indicate meeting vision standards in 4, 10 and 15+ year horizons respectively. This means some projects should be commenced and completed in four years, while others are recommended to start in coming years but continue construction over several years to achieve vision standard over 10 - 15+ years, therefore making the best possible impact on local employment.
