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Region overview

The time series profiles provide details on a range of topics over time. Census data sourced in these profiles compare the latest three Census periods (2006, 2011 and 2016) and are based on place of usual residence (that is, where people usually live, rather than where they were counted on Census night). For some topics, more detailed data are available through the [Queensland Regional Database](#) (also known as QRSIS), developed and maintained by the Queensland Government Statistician's Office, Queensland Treasury.

TSV & NW QLD region comprises the 15 local government areas of Boulia (S), Burdekin (S), Burke (S), Carpentaria (S), Charters Towers (R), Cloncurry (S), Doomadgee (S), Flinders (S), Hinchinbrook (S), McKinlay (S), Mornington (S), Mount Isa (C), Palm Island (S), Richmond (S) and Townsville (C).

TSV & NW QLD region has a total land area of 449,190.9 km², with an average daily temperature range of 18.1°C to 31.9°C and an average annual rainfall of 561 mm.

Data for TSV & NW QLD region are based on Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), Australian Statistical Geography Standard (ASGS), July 2016. In some cases these data have been concorded from other geographical boundaries.

Queensland has a total land area of 1,734,238.8 km², with an average daily temperature range of 16.4°C to 30.0°C and an average annual rainfall of 637 mm.

Data for Queensland are based on Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS), Australian Statistical Geography Standard (ASGS), July 2016.

Demography

Estimated resident population

The estimated resident population (ERP) figure is the official population estimate, and represents the best possible estimate of the resident population. For sub-state geographies, ERP figures are updated annually using a model which includes administrative data that indicate population change, such as registered births and deaths, dwelling approvals, Medicare enrolments and electoral enrolments. Data in this profile topic are updated annually with an approximate delay of 9 months after the reporting period. The next planned update is in April 2018.

- Average annual growth rate of 1.3% over 15 years
- Average annual growth rate of 0.5% over 5 years

Queensland

- ERP of 4,848,877 persons as at 30 June 2016

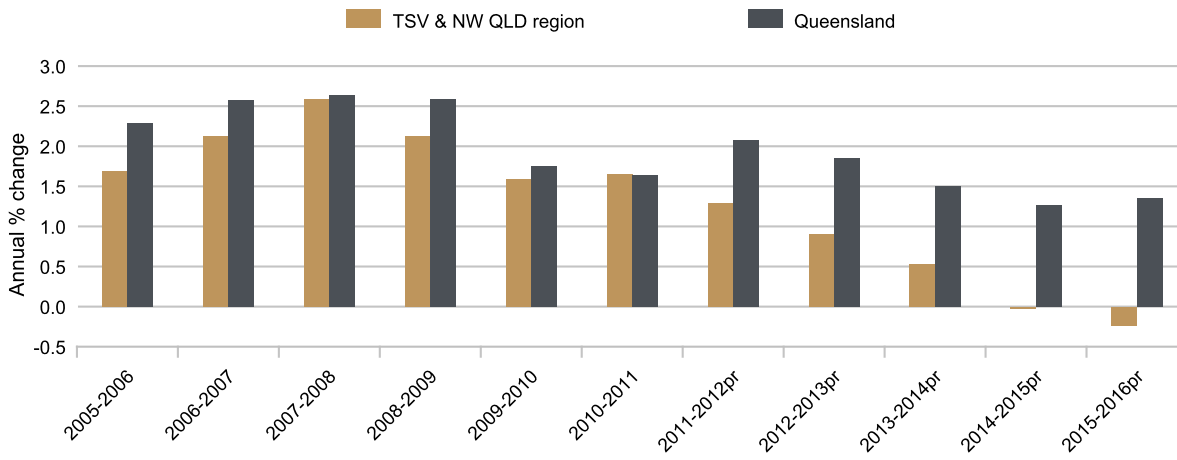

Population by age and sex

The estimated resident population (ERP) figure is the official population estimate, and represents the best possible estimate of the resident population. For sub-state geographies, ERP figures are updated annually using a model which includes administrative data that indicate population change, such as registered births and deaths, dwelling approvals, Medicare enrolments and electoral enrolments. Data in this profile topic are updated annually with an approximate delay of 12 months after the reporting period. The next planned update is in September 2018.

Between 2001 and 2016, the share of persons aged 65 years and over in TSV & NW QLD region increased from

9.0% to 12.6%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2001 and 2016, the average annual growth rate of persons aged 65 years and over was 3.5%
- 0–14 years age group accounted for 23.1% of the population in 2001 and 20.7% in 2016

Queensland

- Between 2001 and 2016, the average annual growth rate of persons aged 65 years and over was 3.7%
- 0–14 years age group accounted for 21.3% of the population in 2001 and 19.7% in 2016

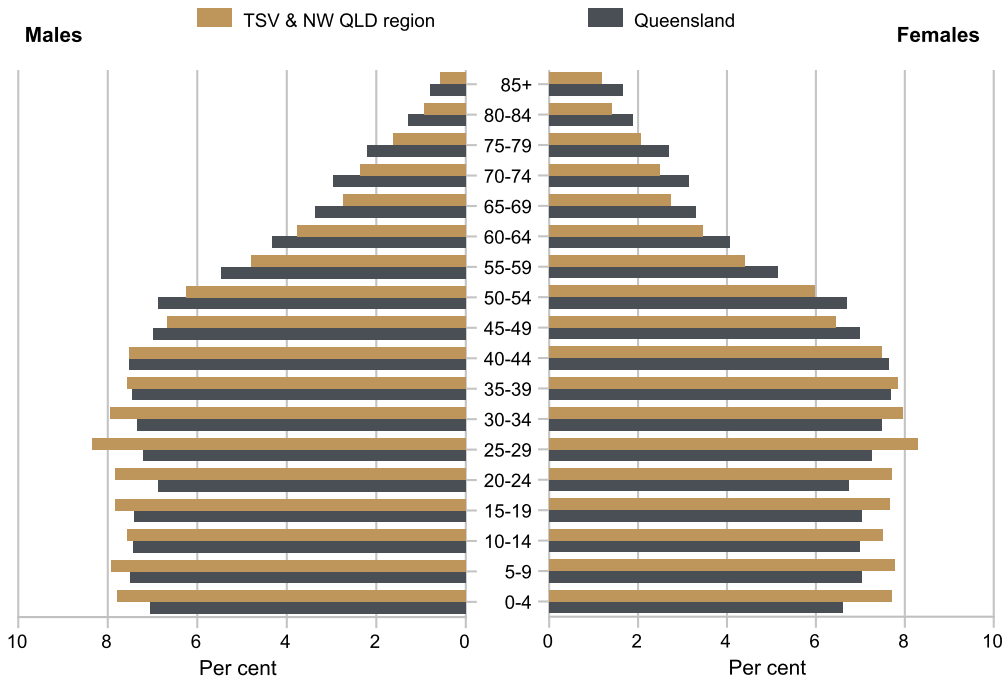

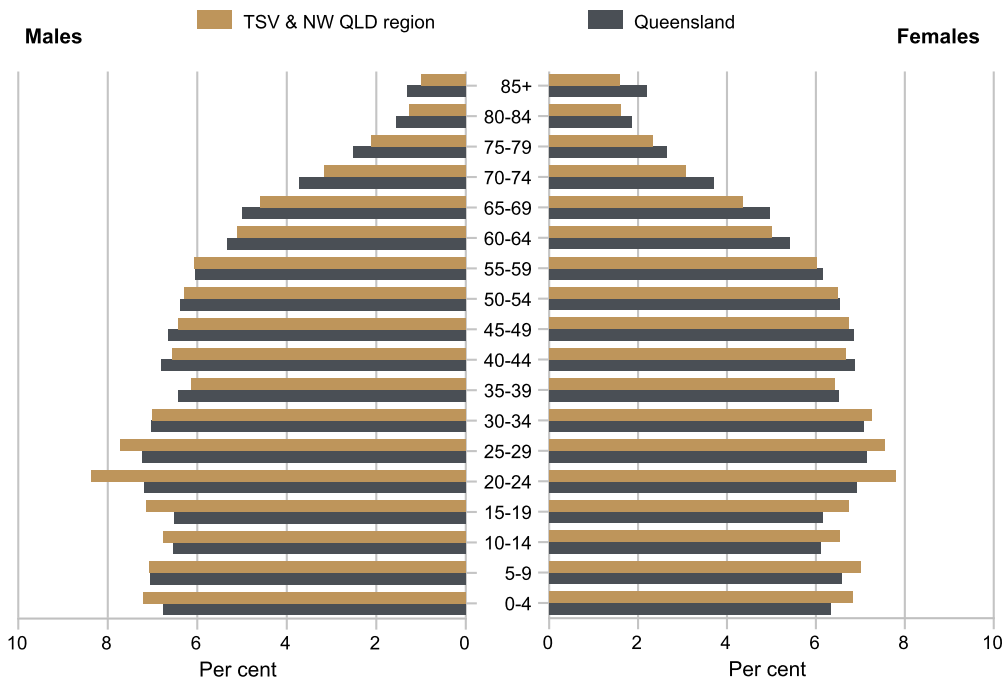

Median age

The median age is the age at which half the population is older and half is younger. These median age estimates have been calculated by Queensland Treasury using single year of age estimated resident population data provided by the ABS. Data in this profile topic are updated annually with an approximate delay of 12 months after the reporting period. The next planned update is in September 2018.

Between 2001 and 2016 the median age in TSV & NW QLD region has increased by

2.8 years

TSV & NW QLD region

- Median age of 34.6 years as at 30 June 2016
- An increase of 2.8 years from median age of 31.8 years as at 30 June 2001

Queensland

- Median age of 37.0 years as at 30 June 2016
- An increase of 2.0 years from median age of 35.0 years as at 30 June 2001

Indigenous Population

Indigenous population is based on the 2006, 2011 and 2016 Census of Population and Housing question about Indigenous status where each person is asked to identify whether they are of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander origin. This is based on persons by place of usual residence.

Between 2006 and 2016, the share of Indigenous persons in TSV & NW QLD region increased from

8.8% to 9.8%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2006 and 2016, the Indigenous population increased by 5,365 persons (26.8%)
- Non-Indigenous persons accounted for 85.2% of the population in 2006 and 82.7% in 2016

Queensland

- Between 2006 and 2016, the Indigenous population increased by 58,901 persons (46.2%)
- Non-Indigenous persons accounted for 91.0% of the population in 2006 and 89.5% in 2016

Country of birth has been derived from the 2006, 2011 and 2016 Census of Population and Housing question '*In which country was the person born?*'. This table is based on place of usual residence.

Between 2006 and 2016, the share of persons born overseas in TSV & NW QLD region increased from

10.6% to 12.5%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2006 and 2016, persons born overseas increased by 8,384 persons (34.8%)
- Australian born persons accounted for 82.3% of the population in 2006 and 79.1% in 2016

Queensland

- Between 2006 and 2016, persons born overseas increased by 316,426 persons (45.2%)
- Australian born persons accounted for 75.2% of the population in 2006 and 71.1% in 2016

Proficiency in spoken English

Proficiency in spoken English has been derived from the 2006, 2011 and 2016 Census of Population and Housing question 'How well does the person speak English?', if the person speaks a language other than English at home. This table is based on place of usual residence.

Between 2006 and 2016, the share of persons who spoke English only in TSV & NW QLD region decreased from

88.9% to 85.1%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2006 and 2016, persons who spoke English only increased by 17,782 persons (8.8%)
- Persons who spoke another language and English not well or not at all accounted for 0.6% of the population in 2006 and 0.8% in 2016

Queensland

- Between 2006 and 2016, persons who spoke English only increased by 448,949 persons (13.3%)
- Persons who spoke another language and English not well or not at all accounted for 1.2% of the population in 2006 and 1.8% in 2016

Household composition

In the context of the Census of Population and Housing, a household is defined as one or more persons, at least one of whom is at least 15 years of age, usually resident in the same private dwelling. Household composition describes the type of household within a dwelling, whether a family is present or not and whether or not other unrelated household members are present. This is based on occupied private dwellings.

Between 2006 and 2016, the share of one parent households in TSV & NW QLD region increased from

10.4% to 10.9%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2006 and 2016, one parent households increased by 2,037 (22.7%)
- Lone person households accounted for 20.4% of total households in 2006 and 22.3% in 2016

Queensland

- Between 2006 and 2016, one parent households increased by 33,798 (21.3%)
- Lone person households accounted for 21.0% of total households in 2006 and 21.7% in 2016

Dwellings by dwelling structure

In general terms, a dwelling is a structure which is intended to have people live in it, and which is habitable on Census Night. The dwelling structure variable classifies the structure of private dwellings enumerated at the time of Census of Population and Housing. This information is determined by the Census collector and is based on occupied private dwellings.

Between 2006 and 2016, the share of separate house dwellings in TSV & NW QLD region decreased from

78.9% to 78.5%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2006 and 2016, separate houses increased by 11,543 dwellings (17.0%)
- Apartments accounted for 12.1% of occupied private dwellings in 2006 and 7.4% in 2016

Queensland

- Between 2006 and 2016, separate houses increased by 183,482 dwellings (15.9%)
- Apartments accounted for 13.0% of occupied private dwellings in 2006 and 11.8% in 2016

Dwellings by tenure type

In general terms, a dwelling is a structure which is intended to have people live in it, and which is habitable on Census Night. The tenure type variable describes whether a household rents or owns the dwelling in which they were enumerated at the time of Census of Population and Housing, or whether the household occupies it under another arrangement. This is based on occupied private dwellings.

Between 2006 and 2016, the share of fully owned dwellings in TSV & NW QLD region decreased from

28.4% to 25.3%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2006 and 2016, fully owned dwellings increased by 1,096 dwellings (4.5%)
- Rented dwellings accounted for 32.9% of occupied private dwellings in 2006 and 34.9% in 2016

Queensland

- Between 2006 and 2016, fully owned dwellings increased by 31,922 dwellings (7.0%)
- Rented dwellings accounted for 30.0% of occupied private dwellings in 2006 and 32.2% in 2016

Industry and development

Building approvals

Information on building approvals are compiled by the ABS, and are collected from sources such as local government authorities and other principal certifying authorities. The estimates for any month may be revised or corrected in later months. This can occur as a result of corrections made by a provider of data, the late provision of approval records and, occasionally, by approvals being identified after construction work has commenced. Data in this profile topic are updated monthly with an approximate delay of 2 months after the reporting period. The next planned update is in March 2018.

Between 2014–15 and 2016–17, the share of new houses in the number of residential building approvals in TSV & NW QLD region increased from

69.2% to 86.8%

TSV & NW QLD region

- Between 2014–15 and 2016–17, the number of approved new houses decreased by 335 (29.1%)
- The number of approved new other residential buildings accounted for 29.5% of the total residential building approvals in 2014–15 and 13.2% in 2016–17
- The value of residential building approvals accounted for 53.0% of the total building value in 2014–15 and 44.9% in 2016–17

Queensland

- Between 2014–15 and 2016–17, the number of approved new houses increased by 1,320 (5.7%)
- The number of approved new other residential buildings accounted for 49.5% of the total residential building approvals in 2014–15 and 42.5% in 2016–17
- The value of residential building approvals accounted for 68.3% of the total building value in 2014–15 and 63.3% in 2016–17

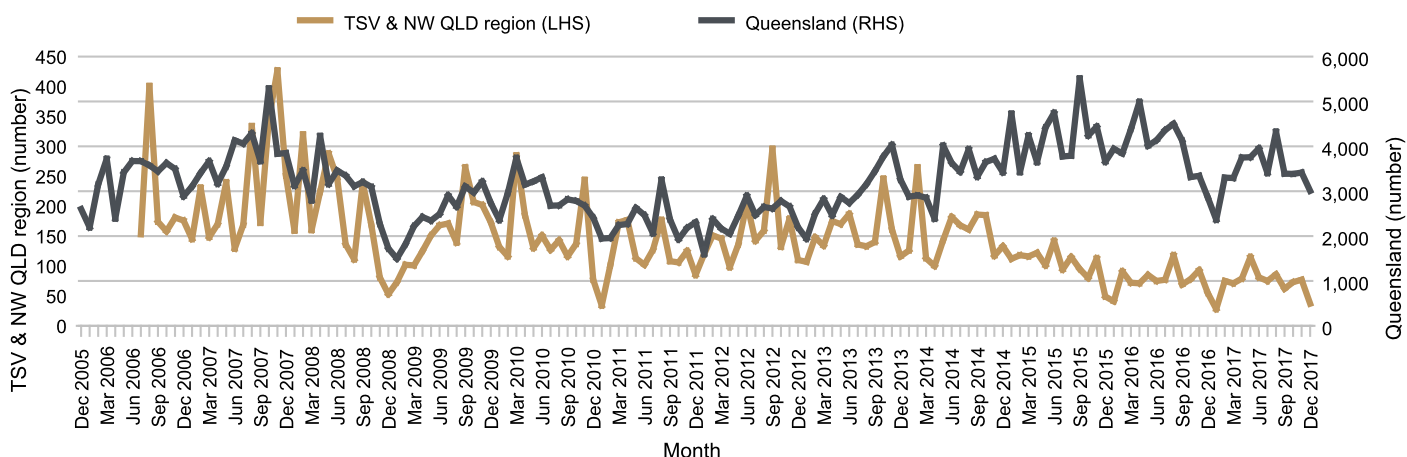

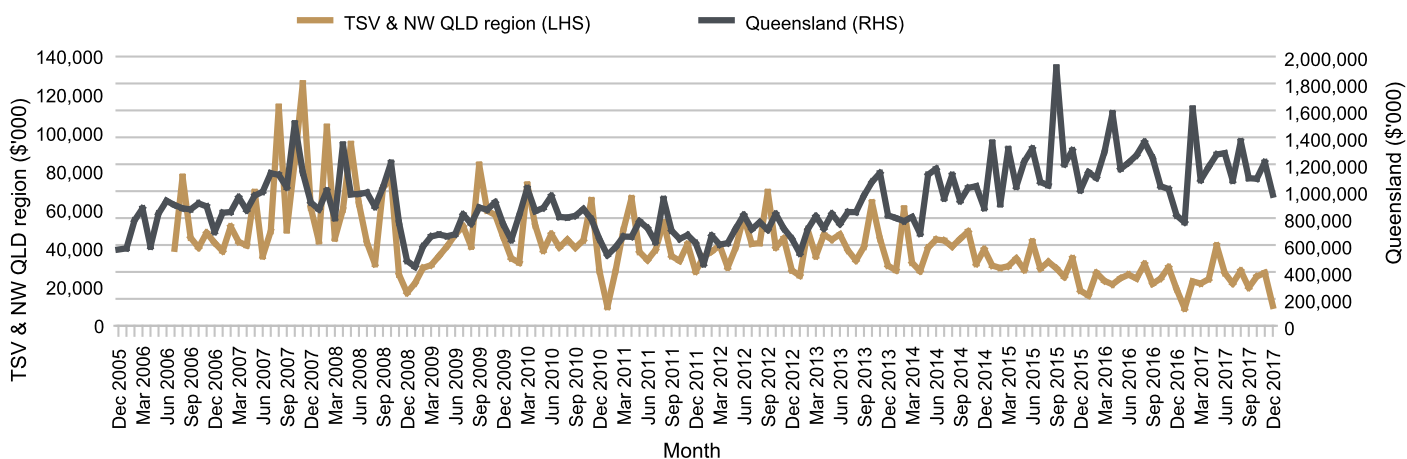

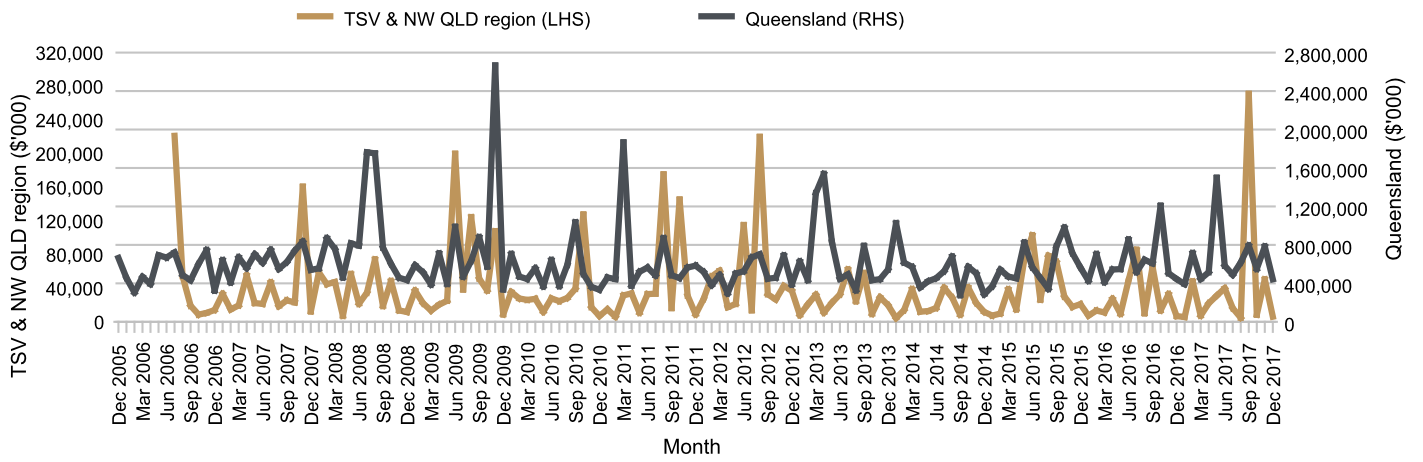
Figure 4 Value of residential building approvals, TSV & NW QLD region and Queensland

Explanatory notes

Profile explanatory notes

Australian Statistical Geography Standard (ASGS)

A geographical framework covering all spatial areas of Australia and its external territories. The ASGS was developed by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) to allow statistics from different collections to be spatially comparable. The ASGS replaced the Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC).

Average annual growth rate

It is calculated as a percentage using the formula below, where P_0 is the population at the start of the period, P_n is the population at the end of the period and n is the length of the period between P_n and P_0 in years.

$$\left[\left(\frac{P_n}{P_0} \right)^{\frac{1}{n}} - 1 \right] \times 100$$

For example, to calculate the average annual rate of population change from 2006 to 2016, n is ten, P_0 is the population in 2006 and P_n is the population in 2016.

Cell confidentialisation

This profile utilises two types of data confidentialisation.

1. Source data confidentialisation - This refers to datasets that have been confidentialised by the data custodians. For example census data supplied by the ABS have small cell counts of 1 or 2 confidentialised to 0 or 3 and a small random adjustment made to all data to avoid any risk of releasing identifiable information. Caution should therefore be used when interpreting data where the cell count is small.
2. Concordance confidentialisation - This refers to datasets that have been concorded to a new geography and the resulting cell count is small. No reliance should be placed on these cell counts and as such have been confidentialised. Tables utilising this type of confidentialisation will report the cell as less than a specific value (for example <5).

Census 2016 data

Census data have 'small random adjustments' to ensure no data are released which could risk identifying individuals. As such, cells containing very small counts should be treated with extreme caution. Therefore discrepancies may occur between the sums of the component items and total.

Census undercount

Due to the size and complexity of the Census of Population and Housing, whenever a Census is conducted it is inevitable that some people will be missed and some will be counted more than once. After each Census, the Australian Bureau of Statistics conduct a Post Enumeration Survey to estimate the number of people who should have been counted in the Census and the actual Census counts. It is important to note, that all Census data reported in this profile do not have any adjustments made for Census undercount and readers should keep this in mind when making inferences from the data.

Local government area (LGA)

A geographical area under the responsibility of a local government council or an Indigenous government council. There are 78 LGAs in Queensland.

Region overview

Statistics in the profile overview have been derived from data sourced to the Bureau of Meteorology and aggregated to administrative boundaries.

Rounding

Figures are rounded to nearest whole number. Calculations (such as percentages and rates) are based on pre-rounded figures.

Topic explanatory notes

Country of birth

The list of countries are based on the most common Country of Birth responses (excluding Australia) reported in the 2011 Census. The categories of persons born in ESB and NESB countries are derived by aggregating countries from Table T08 of the Time Series Profile (TSP). Due to the process of confidentialisation applied to the Census data by the ABS, total persons born overseas have been taken directly from Table T01 of the TSP to provide a more accurate count.

Employment by industry

Based on Australian and New Zealand Standard Industrial Classification (ANZSIC), 2006 edition, revision 2 published in 2013.

Employment by occupation

Based on Australian and New Zealand Standard Classification of Occupations (ANZSCO), 2006 edition, version 1.2 released in 2013.

Indigenous

Refers to people who identify themselves as being of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander origin.

Median age

Median estimates have been calculated by the ABS and Queensland Treasury.

Proficiency in spoken English

Based on the most common Language Spoken at Home responses reported in the 2011 Census for Australia.
